Using the legacies in our recovery.



From our Delegate:

Stepping Through the Legacies was the theme of our 2022 Ohio Area Convention (OAC). I loved the art developed to convey footprints stepping through the three triangles, representing the Steps, Traditions and Concepts. And the message of taking those steps, which guide me on my path to recovery, was perfect.

When I think of stepping, it is a deliberate motion, made with intention. I am not jumping, or hopping, or skipping. For me that is what Al-Anon has been, an intentional journey, often slowly, occasionally with an insight or awareness, always moving toward recovery.

The OAC this year was especially joyful because we were back in person for the first time since 2019. Our Higher Power was definitely present, providing Plan B speakers and workshops, that were exactly what I needed to hear. A big thank you to the Districts of Toledo who stepped up and stepped out to make OAC possible.

As it says in our Al-Anon/Alateen Service Manual (P24/27) "The threefold guides of Al-Anon point the way to a normal, useful life for the individual. They also are a framework within which the groups can carry on their affairs in harmony."

I couldn't and can't think my way into serenity or recovery. It requires action, and all of our 36 legacies put me on the path of what action I can take. Recovery through the Steps – I begin to discover who I am. Unity through the Traditions – I begin to discover how to participate in a healthy manner in any group. Service through the Concepts – from 1 on 1 sharing to participating in worldwide Al-Anon through the links of service to participating in the society and world I live in.

I appreciate how much members practice of Step 12, Tradition 7 and Concept 4 contributed to my recovery early on:

- I came to Al-Anon 33 years ago at a counselor's suggestion who gave me a copy of the meetings directory. She had the directory because there was Public Outreach from a local information service that provided one to her.
- When I got to the meetings, there was both free literature for me to take home and other literature available for purchase. That literature was there at those meetings because they had purchased it at the local Literature Distribution Center (LDC) which was purchased from the World Service Office (WSO).
- The WSO could provide literature to groups and LDCs because members had written in to share their experiences, strength, and hope and others had volunteered to become involved in the publication process. I subscribed to the Forum in those first few months of recovery, because the groups I went to used it in their meetings.
- I went to my first Special Event Workshop in the first 6 months of my recovery because there was an active special events committee as the result of groups active participation in Intergroup (AIS=Area Information Services).

As I continue on this journey of recovery, I continue to discover new meanings in each of our Legacies and how to apply the different spiritual principles that I have found there:

Honesty, Hope, Commitment, Willingness, Integrity, Humility, Compassion, Love, Perseverance, Awareness, Open-Mindedness, Spiritual Service, Unity, Autonomy, Respect, Courtesy, Boundaries, Humility, Anonymity, Responsibility, Accountability, Mutual Trust, Participation, Acceptance

The Warranties pretty much sum up the whole program for me. From our Al-Anon/Alateen Service Manual on page 215 "All the Warranties counsel prudence—prudence in personal relations, prudence in money matters, and prudence in our contacts with the world around us. For Al-Anon, prudence is a middle ground, a channel between fear on the one hand and recklessness on the other. Prudence creates a climate of harmony, effectiveness, and consistent spiritual progress."

I am writing this on the twenty-first anniversary of my first Al Anon meeting at Church in the Woods. I arrived for the beginners' meeting and Joann S. was there. I will never forget her kind face. I don't remember the words she spoke, but they were nice the way they sounded. I was at the end of my

rope. I had just come back from a vacation in North Carolina where every night was spent dealing with black out drinking and I was worn out. I am not sure what I was really looking for that night, but I think one word sums it

up: respite. I was deep in isolation—I needed the fellowship. My denial was choking me—I needed awareness and acceptance. I was carrying unearned guilt and shame—I needed loving detachment. I had tried talking to family members—I needed a place where people would simply listen, not give advice. I was an emotional basket case—I needed peace of mind and some serenity. Twenty one years ago, I didn't know I needed any of that stuff! All I knew is that I had just made it to that meeting and I might find some help. Now, when a tortured newcomer drags themselves through the door and I am sitting in the meeting, may my body mind spirit be flooded with all these memories and please God, let it begin with me.
